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#### I. INTRODUCTION

# A. Project Background

- 1. The 'Tripura Urban and Tourism Development Project (ADB Loan No. 4375 IND)' is a transformative initiative undertaken by Government of Tripura with financial support from the Asian Development Bank (ADB). The project aims to enhance urban and tourism infrastructure across the state, fostering sustainable development and economic growth. The project aims to Improve essential services like water supply, storm water drainage, and road infrastructure to enhance urban livability and resilience and to boost tourism by developing integrated facilities in 12 urban towns, including seven District Headquarters (DHQs) and five Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) and four Tourism destinations. The project is designed to enhance the Tourism infrastructure, to strengthen Tripura Tourism to boost the local economy. The project aims to contribute to the state's overall socio-economic development by integrating urban and tourism growth.
- 2. The investment plan for integrated development in tourism sector has been prepared for the 4 selected tourism locations (1st Phase) at an estimated cost of INR 179.72 Crore i.e., INR 1793.50 million. This cost is centred round the civil works i.e., development of infrastructural facilities and amenities, integrated landscaping, waterfront development and procurement of goods in the selected tourism locations. The sub component of Chabimura tourist destination pertains to (i) upgradation of eco-tourism destination at Chabimura (ii) water front development of Amar Sagar at Amarpur and (iii) water front development of Fatik Sagar at Amarpur. The proposed total estimated cost for development of Chabimura destination is INR 67.76 Crore i.e., INR 677.6 million. These sub projects have been shortlisted as there will be economic benefits pertaining to the development of high-end tourism destination. The tourism destination development works will include landscaping, eco-accommodation, redevelopment of boat jetty, lake edge/embankment re-strengthening, provision of cafeteria, basic infrastructure facilities, etc. The location map of the three packages i.e., Chabimura, Fatik Sagar and Amar Sagar is shown as under.

- 3. The infrastructural development for tourism will improve basic infrastructure and services in the selected tourism destinations in the State of Tripura as one of the key drivers for economic growth. Project's focus attention will be on: (i) improving basic tourism infrastructure and services, such as installation of water ATM, providing of sex disaggregated toilet blocks, universal accessibility considering elderly, women, children and especially abled, environmental and basic services improvement at existing and emerging tourism destinations to ensure proper amenities and safety for the visitors and protect nature and culture-based attractions. Physical infrastructure investments will be accompanied by: (ii) capacity building programs for concerned sector agencies and local communities for better management of the tourist destinations and for more active participation in the tourism-related economic activities, respectively.
- 4. This updated Due Diligence Report (DDR) has been updated to assess the land acquisition and resettlement impacts. Assessment is made based on site visits carried out by Social Safeguard team, Project Management and Supervision Consultant (PMSC) along with engineers and in consultation with the concerned Government authorities namely the Tripura Tourism Development Corporation Limited (TTDCL). The land area intended for development under Tourism Project initiatives at Chabimura, Fatik Sagar and Amar Sagar is under the ownership of various department. Though different land parcels have been found to be owned by different departments, the tourism infrastructure development works under the ensuing loan has been undertaken within the land parcels where NOC from other related departments is provided to TTDCL.

## B. Scope of this Due Diligence Report

- 5. This updated land Acquisition, Involuntary Resettlement and Indigenous Peoples Due Diligence Report has been prepared for the proposed sub-projects, i.e., upgradation of ecotourism destination at Chabimura and waterfront development of Fatik Sagar and Amar Sagar. The main objective of due diligence exercise is to confirm that the project is free of involuntary resettlement impact such as land acquisition, physical displacement, economic displacement, impact on livelihood, community properties or any other impacts, based on a review of documents, stakeholder consultations and field visits and observation to proposed project locations. This document describes the findings and provides copies of relevant documents, minutes of meetings and photographs.
- 6. The site for tourism development activities was selected based on a study clubbed with observations which was carried out including ownership of status of land parcel from where the boat ride initiates on river Gomati and also considering other factors like, HFL of the river, aesthetic beauty, biodiversity, existing livelihood activities in the river by the Hachwk Mwtai SHG and local communities including boating, fishing etc. To propose the intervention based on the selection of sites and activities that are undertaken in the project, TTDCL officials, along with engaged consultants, carried out site visits and conducted consultations with the concerned stakeholders. The Land Acquisition, Involuntary Resettlement and Indigenous Peoples Due Diligence Report has been updated based on the revised design (as per approved master plan) and shifting of location of proposed components within the same plot of land under the package. Key changes and modifications have been introduced in the design and alignment, considering the recent incidence and impacts of flooding. These updates aim to address potential vulnerabilities and enhance project overall resilience to such natural events in future. Based on the obtaining of NOCs from other related departments the DDR will again be updated as required.
- 7. A due diligence process was conducted to examine the land acquisition, resettlement and indigenous people's issues in detail based on the approved final design, aligned with ADB SPS, 2009. This report describes the findings and provides copies of relevant documents, community consultations and photographs. Prior to implementation, indigenous peoples related impacts (if any) has been assessed. The final document will be reviewed and disclosed

on Implementing Agency (IA) and ADB's websites. The initial document has been approved by ADB; hence, the contract package has been awarded and civil works started. Depending on the change of the location within the same plot of land, design and change of alignment for the components, the updated draft DDR will get updated from time to time. The Implementing Agency (IA) has handed over the project land/site to the contractor free of any encumbrance, for which the NOC has been received for Plot no. 1 and 2 the land parcel is under the ownership of the Tourism Department. NOC has also been received from Public Work Department (PWD) for plot no. 33. Furthermore, plot no. 5, 6, 7 is under the possession of District Magistrate & Collector, Udaipur, Gomti District and process of obtaining NOC for the same has been initiated (Letter appended as **Appendix 2**) and no work has been undertaken on those mentioned land parcels.

## C. Requirement of Due Diligence Report

- 8. The work components proposed at Chabimura, Amar Sagar and Fatik Sagar will not result in any kind of permanent or temporary land acquisition or resettlement impacts because all the proposed project activities are going on within the Government owned land. There is no encroachment either by any private parties on the land. There are few kiosks which are run by the members of Hachwk Mwtai, a SHG in Chabimura near the jetty area and these are not going to be affected during execution of any kind of tourism development related activities at Chabimura. As the intervention is on Government owned vacant land, hence, no land acquisition and involuntary resettlement requirements are envisaged. As there is no involuntary resettlement involved under this sub-project, hence, preparation of this Due Diligence Report (DDR) and there is no requirement for preparation of Resettlement Plan (RP) for this package. This brief Land Acquisition, Involuntary Resettlement and Indigenous Peoples Due-Diligence Report has been prepared in accordance with ADB's Safeguard Policy Statement (June, 2009) for project processing and clearance. The report summarizes the project impact and outcome etc.
- 9. In accordance with Safeguard Policy Statement, 2009 requirements, the project is defined as 'B' category for overall impact. The revised design of this subproject confirms that the rehabilitation and construction works would be conducted on property owned by the Government, hence, no IR impact is anticipated due to project activities. However, during the time of project execution or construction activities, if any kind of unanticipated impact arises, necessary measures as per ADB Safeguard Policy Statement 2009 would be taken and informed to ADB accordingly. According to the assessment done, field visits, consultations (public and stakeholder), observations etc., no IR impact or involuntary land acquisition is envisaged under the package TTDCL/CHB/W. If any kind of unavoidable impact is encountered during construction activities, it will be mitigated accordingly.
- 10. As far as tourism related development work at Fatik Sagar and Amar Sagar is concerned, for landscaping NOCs have been obtained from Amarpur Nagar Panchayat and for any kind of other works related to development of front part of the lakes, NOC has been provided by the Directorate of Fisheries for Fatik Sagar and Amar Sagar (**Appendix-5, 6 and 7**).
- 11. In addition to this, TTDCL has also provided self-declaration for the following:
  - (i) Declaration that no project interventions are proposed on the land owned by forest (bearing Plot No. 3 and 4) in Chabimura.
  - (ii) Declaration that there will be no hindrances or temporary suspension of fishing, boating or any other commercial activity in the Gomati River located in Chabimura which may cause loss of any kind of livelihood to any individual or community. (**Appendix 9**).

(iii) Declaration that there will be no hindrance so or temporary suspension of fishing or any other commercial activity in Fatik and Amar Sagar located in Chabimura which may cause loss of livelihood to any individual or community. (**Appendix 10**).

#### II. PROJECT AREA & SUBPROJECT DESCRIPTION

- 12. The Chabimura (Chobimura/Chakwakma in Tripuri language) is known for its rock carvings on steep mountain wall on the bank of Gomati River. Huge rock carvings of Shiva, Vishnu, Kartika, Mahisasura Mardini Durga and other Gods and Goddesses are seen during the boat ride on the river. Chabimura is in the Amarpur Sub-division, which is 30 kms away from Udaipur and 7.5 kms from Amarpur. This tourist destination dates back to 15<sup>th</sup>-16<sup>th</sup> century. The 20 acres of land has been identified for planned interventions for developing eco-accommodation, river protection structures along the east bank of the river and landscaping of the open field with the basic facilities and amenities for the tourists.
- 13. The two prominent man-made lakes i.e., Fatik Sagar and Amar Sagar are located in the Amarpur town. A temple of Goddess Mangal Chandi is situated at the southern bank of Amar Sagar Lake, which was constructed during 15<sup>th</sup> century. The temple showcases both Hindu and Buddhist religious beliefs. Fairs and festivals are also celebrated at the bank of the lake. The Fatik Sagar is bounded by road on all side. The Sagarika Tourist Lodge, owned by Department of Tourism, is located on the north side of the lake.
- 14. Amarpur Town is spread over an area of 3.57 km², located at 23°53'N latitude and 91°64'E longitude. The town is situated in the Gomati District of Tripura State. It was name after King Amar Manikya. The town itself is the headquarter of Amarpur sub-division.
- 15. There are a few promising tourist attractions in and around Amarpur town, however, the most important sites being Chabimura Fatik Sagar and Amar Sagar as they are the historical locations. The proposed developments under this project can provide an impetus to the economic and cultural life of the city.
- 16. All the sub-components under Chabimura have been divided into 3 packages. The package numbers for the mentioned intervention of the Chabimura tourist destination are TTDCL/CHB/W/01, TTDCL/CHB/W/03 and TTDCL/CHB/W/04.
- 17. The sub- components as proposed under this package will include the following:

18. The proposed developments under this project can provide an impetus to the economic and cultural life of the city. The components under Chabimura have been divided into three (03) packages, (i) Upgradation of the eco-tourism destination at Chabimura, (ii) Waterfront development of Fatik Sagar, and (iii) Waterfront development of Amar Sagar. Summary of the subproject components is provided in **Table 1**.

19. The shifting of alignment and location within the same plot of land has not resulted into any kind of adverse impact. As per the preliminary design, location of the structures was closer to the river, however, due to the occurrence of recent floods, the location of the structures, to be constructed were shifted towards the pathways due to mitigate future scouring of river.

#### III. FIELD WORK AND PUBLIC CONSULTATION

- 20. No person or community is being negatively impacted by this project. The entire population of nearest towns, Amarpur, Udaipur including the tourists will benefit from this subproject initiatives. No land or asset acquisition is required for this sub-project. Thus, no physical or economical displacement is anticipated. No common property resources (CPR) either will get impacted due to the proposed interventions. Also, vulnerable groups such as the poor, women and their children, person with disability, the elderly, scheduled tribes and other ethnic groups will not be adversely impacted. Since there is no adverse impact anticipated hence, Census and Socio- Economic Survey of the affected persons is not required. Public and stakeholders' consultations were conducted by the project team to disseminate project related information and also comprehend the possible perception of the people regarding the subproject.
- 21. The earlier land parcels earmarked for tourism development activities at Chabimura tourism destination were bearing multiple plot numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 580, 33 and the ownership too was lying with different departments. Out of the mentioned 9 land parcels, NOC (Appendix 1) for Plot No. 1 & 2 has been obtained from TTDCL as the said parcel of land belongs to TTDCL. On the other hand, plot no. 3 and 4 belong to the Forest department and no project activities will be undertaken in the said plots (self-declaration appended as Appendix 8). Location of plot no. 3 and 4 is such that it had to be taken into consideration even if no activities will be undertaken in the mentioned plot numbers. Furthermore, plot no. 5, 6, 7 and 580 is under the possession of District Magistrate & Collector, Udaipur, Gomati District and process of obtaining NOC for the same has been initiated (Letter appended as Appendix 2). As per the revised design no project activities will be undertaken in plot no 580. In addition to it, plot no. 33 is under the ownership of PWD and working NOC has been provided to TTDCL (Appendix 3). The signed copy of the Chabimura land demarcation is in Appendix 4.
- 22. Joint site visits and discussions/meetings were carried out to also assess the land acquisition and resettlement impacts for Chabimura, Fatik Sagar and Amar Sagar along with TTDCL officials, social and environment team of PMSC including the engineers. The DDR for land acquisition and resettlement plan was prepared based on assessment of available records, site visit and public consultations. Attendees mainly expressed their happiness because of selection of the area and structure for this project.
- 23. During public consultations, participants were of the opinion that this sub-project is important and very much needed for overall development of the area. All participants present during consultations welcomed the project and showed their willingness to support and cooperate with the project. The people present were very happy to know about the project and were of the opinion that the detailed project information should be disseminated to more and more people through different medium. There was no opposition for this sub-project as this proposed project will be on land already owned by Government of Tripura (GoT). Detail consultation report has been appended as **Appendix -11**.
- 24. In addition to the above-mentioned public consultations, stakeholders' meetings were also held with Hon'ble Deputy Chief Minister along with officials of line departments regarding finalization of project activities and the related modalities to be followed.

#### IV. LAND AVAILABILITY AND RESETTLEMENT IMPACTS

- 25. The land area earmarked for Tourism Destination development at Chabimura is admeasuring 20 acres where intervention of tourism infrastructure activities is proposed and the ownership of the land is lying with Tripura Tourism Development Corporation Limited (TTDCL), Department of Public Works and Revenue Department, Government of Tripura. The location is an attraction for the tourists due to its resemblance with amazon like features and the huge rock carvings of Goddess Durga and other Gods and Goddesses.
- 26. On the other hand, Lake front development has been proposed for both Fatik Sagar and Amar Sagar. This will include re-strengthening of the lake edge/embankment, ghat development. Pedestrian promenade, development of parks, development of tourist facilities and amenities and integrated landscaping including, drainage, etc. Both the lakes are under the ownership of Amarpur Nagar Panchayat.
- 27. The sub-project will not result into any permanent or temporary land acquisition, and no resettlement impact is envisaged as the proposed site is owned by the government.
- 28. There is no encroachment by any private parties on the land. There are no squatters or kiosks either residing or conducting any commercial activities within the premise of subproject site area.
- 29. Copies of the revenue maps and records have been provided as **Appendix-15 to 18**. A site assessment has been conducted, confirming that there are no encroachments, squatters, or ongoing commercial activities within the Chabimura, Fatik Sagar, and Amar Sagar proposed sub-project areas designated for development. All construction work will be carried out on unused vacant government land, ensuring that no existing structures are affected or altered. No work will be conducted on any pre-existing structures, and necessary safety measures will be strictly implemented throughout the construction process to prevent any disruptions or risks. Additionally, special provisions and arrangements will be made to ensure easy access for visitors.

#### V. INDIGENOUS PEOPLES

## A. Identification of Indigenous Peoples

- 30. As per ADB SPS 2009, the Indigenous Peoples' safeguards are triggered if a project directly or indirectly affects the dignity, human rights, livelihood systems, or culture of Indigenous Peoples or affects the territories or natural or cultural resources that Indigenous Peoples' own, use, occupy, or claim as an ancestral domain or asset. The term Indigenous Peoples is used to refer to a distinct, vulnerable, social and cultural group possessing the following characteristics in varying degrees: (i) self-identification as members of a distinct indigenous cultural group and recognition of this identity by others; (ii) collective attachment to geographically distinct habitats or ancestral territories in the project area and to the natural resources in these habitats and territories; (iii) customary cultural, economic, social, or political institutions that are separate from those of the dominant society and culture; and (iv) a distinct language, often different from the official language of the country or region.
- 31. The term indigenous peoples is understood to be synonymous with the communities defined by the Constitution of India as scheduled tribes, as follows: "Scheduled tribes (scheduled tribes) are those communities notified as such by the President of India under Article 342 of the Constitution. The first notification was issued in 1950. The President considers characteristics like (i) tribes' primitive traits; (ii) distinctive culture; (iii) shyness with the public at large; (iv) geographical isolation; and (v) social and economic backwardness before notifying them as a scheduled tribe. A scheduled tribe will have one of these factors by the respective markers. Essentially, indigenous peoples have a social and cultural identity distinctly different from the mainstream (or dominant) society that makes them marginalized, socially isolated, and often overlooked in the development process.
- 32. Specific Action Plan: Further, to address any potential safeguards issues and ensure maximum benefits reach the scheduled tribe households, a specific action plan for indigenous peoples is proposed for this sub-component. The action plan will carry out the following specific activities: (i) a baseline survey will be conducted for identification of potential indigenous peoples' households within a radius of 2 kms. from the Chabimura destination for carrying out probable income generation activities related to tourism; (ii) proposed benefits to indigenous peoples households will be shared and monitored; (iii) IEC materials, information sharing, consultations will be culturally sensitive and appropriate when implemented in the scheduled area; (iv) in case of any indigenous peoples impacts in sub-component, the chief of the tribe or a member of the tribal council may act as traditional arbitrator (to ensure that traditional grievance redress systems are integrated) and an NGO working with indigenous peoples. GRC will also ensure that grievance redress established is gender inclusive in receiving and facilitating resolution of the IPs' concerns; (v) consultations with IP households will be conducted in all stages which shall help in identifying any culture-specific requirements and traditions like avoidance of any specific festival days, and/or other activities with cultural significance to the IP communities during civil work; and any other IP related issues and concerns that may be of importance to the community; (vi) Contractual provisions will ensure that scheduled tribe households in the project coverage area at Chabimura will benefit from development and construction of tourism related infrastructure and other associated amenities by getting various types of livelihood scopes, including opportunity to work as construction labours during project related civil work, selling of their indigenous products to the visiting tourists etc. which will provide them with a supplementary income source too; (vii) In case any claim or complaint is submitted during the construction period, an effective and efficient IP inclusive Grievance Redress Mechanism will be in place which will enhance provision of timely and sensible hearings and facilitate solutions. This information will be disseminated during consultations with stakeholders.

- 33. A Training Need Assessment (TNA) will be done among the local community to identify their choices and preferences for developing and enhancing their skill. Skill training institutes close to the project area will be identified, or a community-based outreach skill development program will also be explored by involving national and state-level accredited skill development institutes. A separate budget will be prepared for this. The women member of the boat operator's family will be given special preference, or any other enthusiastic person from among the indigenous people's community will be encouraged to take part in the training program. Linkage with state or national-level schemes for the socio-economical upliftment of indigenous communities will be explored. Since Chabimura is a prominent tourist place, training on "Tourist Guide" may also benefit the local people. The SAP also considers to converge and establish linkages between the tribal people from the project area with the Department of Tribal Welfare, Government of Tripura, related to different government schemes. The summary of skill development schemes and schemes for tribal people prevailing in the state of Tripura has been provided in **Appendix 30**
- 34. Two separate agencies need to be hired for the TUTDP project- one for Sustainability Awareness and Capacity Building Consultancy, and the other for Tourism Promotion, Marketing, and Capacity Building Consultancy. These two consultants will be responsible for carrying out training need assessments and conducting relevant training programs aimed at capacity enhancement and skill development of stakeholders involved in the project.
- 35. The proposed action plan with activities, timelines and responsibilities is attached as **Appendix 19**. This action plan will be used for project monitoring to ensure that IP activities are undertaken on a timely basis and reported semi-annually and to determine whether project objectives have been achieved.
- 36. In the State of Tripura, where scheduled tribes are also referred as tribal people, there are 19 such groups. Out of the 19 declared Scheduled Tribe groups, Reang have been notified as Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Groups (PVTG) in Tripura in terms of backwardness under different development indicators. As per the initial assessment, no negative impact on the PVTG is anticipated for the proposed sub component of tourism infrastructure development. The tribal population of Tripura increased to 11,66,813 in 2011 from 9,93,426 in 2001. As per 2011 census the total population of Tripura state is 36, 74,000 out of which the tribal population constitutes 31.8% of the total population of the State. The **Table** 66 below shows the list of tribal communities in the state of Tripura as per Ministry of Tribal Affairs, Government of India and their population growth in different census years.

37. The identified project area of Chabimura in mostly inhabited by the Jamatia and Reang tribal population. The proportion of the mentioned tribe can be seen from the above table which depicts the fact that concentration of tribal population is maximum in Baramura/ Deotamura Reserve Forest (part) and Debbari/ Chapiabari. Livelihood activities of the tribal population in the project area is mostly centered round collection of minor forest produces, cutting of trees to be used as cooking fuel, weaving and working as boat operator for the visiting tourists. Fishing activities in the river also forms a part of their activity on intermittent basis and is done for the purpose of self-consumption. The existing arrangement for the tribal people working as boat operator for the visiting tourists is through a SHG constituted of 12 tribal male members. The SHG has been provided with motor boats under an agreement done between TTDCL and the SHG named Hachwk Mwtai. The components or the assets of

TTDCL for operating and managing by the SHG as mentioned in the agreement (**Appendix 20**) are motor boats, tourist shed, cultural stage, path way, staircase, guide point, cafeteria ticket counter, parking area, drinking water facilities etc. The agreement is done for a period of one year with condition of renewal in the consecutive years. There are 5 number of motor boats provided to the SHG by TTDCL which is shared and operated by 12 members on a rotation basis as decided and accepted by the members themselves.

38. The proposed developmental activities related to tourism will not result into any kind of hindrances or temporary suspension of fishing, boating or other commercial activities which may cause livelihood disruption neither for the members of SHG nor for the tribal people doing fishing activities for self-consumption as no work has been proposed to be taken in the water body (self-declaration by TTDCL appended as **Appendix 9**).

# B. Project Impact on Indigenous People

39. There will be no negative impact on any section of the Indigenous Peoples (IPs) population. All the proposed construction activities will be done within the vacant government land. The subprojects under the mentioned packages, are categorized as category "B" for Indigenous Peoples. As no tribal population under the proposed subprojects is getting adversely impacted, no Indigenous peoples Plan (IPP) will be needed for this sub-project. The nearest towns of the proposed sub-projects destination are Amarpur and Udaipur. Amarpur town has a total population of 10,838 as per population Census 2011, out of which 411 are Scheduled Tribe (that constitutes around 3.79% ST population). Udaipur town has a total population of 32,758 as per population Census 2011, out of which 363 are Scheduled Tribe (that constitutes around 1.11% ST population). The proposed sub-project will have no adverse impact on any scheduled tribe population or on the community in general. On the other hand, the proposed sub-project will benefit the scheduled tribe population, general population and the tourists coming to Chabimura, Fatik Sagar and Amar Sagar by providing recreational space and facilities, tourism related activities etc. Furthermore, the proposed project development will not entail any interface with the community people or with scheduled tribe people during the period of construction. Contractual provisions will ensure that scheduled tribe households in the coverage area within a radius of 2 kms will benefit from development and construction of tourism related infrastructure and other associated amenities by getting various types of income earning opportunities, including working as construction labour during project related civil work, selling of their indigenously made products to the visiting tourists etc. which will provide them with a supplementary income source.

#### VI. SUMMARY FINDINGS, OTHER SOCIAL MEASURES & RECOMMENDATIONS

- 40. In this Sub-Project intervention, any kind of full or partial, permanent or temporary, physical and economic displacements is not envisaged. There will not be any adverse impact on people, livelihood, land or structure and common property resources.
- 41. Overall categorization for the project is category "B" for IR impact and also for impact on Indigenous People (IP) as per the ADB's Safeguard Policy Statement (SPS), 2009. Screening questions form for IP categorization is placed as **Appendix 21.**
- 42. It is concluded from this due diligence study that the proposed infrastructure improvements will not change substantially the present land use; there will be no issues of land acquisition and resettlement related to this sub-project. All facilities will be built on Government land and on the existing structures. Due to project intervention, there will be no loss of income of any person or any assets, either privately owned or publicly owned.
- 43. During execution of works, trainings will be undertaken for construction staffs/PIUs etc. It will also be ensured that Contractor/PIUs adhere to the following code of conduct while undertaking any kind of civil activities:
  - (i) Local labour including indigenous people should be given preference in the construction activity and female workers should be engaged and given equal opportunity in the civil construction works (if any) such as equal pay and provisions under core labor standards.
  - (ii) Provision of drinking water and sanitation should be at the work site and separate toilet for male and female workers should be made at the site / camp.
  - (iii) Good civil construction practices should be adopted. Only qualified personnel undertaking tasks relevant to their duties, provision of suitable personal protection equipment.
  - (iv) No activities to be undertaken in adverse weather conditions.
  - (v) Provision will be made in the plan for separate entry and exit to the complex (if applicable), so the chances of accident are negligible during work. For the existing users, mitigation measures to be followed includes laying of wooden planks, iron sheets and creation of separate pathways.
  - (vi) Trash will be regularly removed from the site.
  - (vii) Entire area will be declared as plastic free, smoking free and appropriate sign boards for the purpose will be displayed at work site.
  - (viii) Prior to commencement of site activities and mobilization on ground, the Contractor will prepare and get approved by the Engineer, circulation plan during construction for safe passage of visitors/tourists during work execution stage, including development of alternative access routes, signage, etc.

#### VII. GRIEVANCE REDRESSAL MECHANISM

- 44. A Grievance Redressal Mechanism has already been established, to evaluate, and facilitate the resolution of social, environmental or any other project-related grievances. The GRM will aim to provide a time-bound and transparent mechanism to voice and resolve social and environmental concerns linked to the project. The public awareness campaign will generate awareness of the project and its grievance redress procedures. The campaign will ensure that the poor, vulnerable, and others know about the GRM.
- 45. The GRM will provide an accessible, inclusive, gender-sensitive and culturally appropriate platform for receiving and facilitating the resolution of affected persons' grievances related to the project. The multi-tier GRM for the project is outlined below, each tier having time-bound schedules and with responsible persons identified to facilitate and address grievances at each stage. ULB-wide public awareness campaigns will ensure that awareness of grievance redress procedures is generated through the campaign. The project coordinator (urban and tourism), supported by independent consultants (social and environment), will be responsible for timely grievance redress on environmental and social safeguards issues.
- 46. Besides the project's grievance redress mechanism, the state also has a centralized public grievance redress monitoring system (CPGRMS) where the general public can file grievances through a dedicated web portal (grievance.tripura.gov.in). The general administrative (administrative reforms) department is the nodal agency, and an officer of the rank of joint secretary is responsible for its functioning. Each department of the state has nominated officers to receive the grievances. Tripura Urban Planning & Development Authority (TUDA) and Department of Tourism (DoT) have nominated officers of the rank of Deputy Director as nodal officers, whose names and contact details are provided on its website. The affected persons can also lodge their complaints through this online portal.
- 47. **Information to the stakeholders about the GRM**: The stakeholders, including affected persons, will be informed about the GRM under the project and of the state through public consultations, disclosures, and distribution of public information booklets (PIB). In the case of illiterate DPs, the information will be provided verbally during meetings with them.
- 48. **Who can complain:** A complaint can be registered by stakeholders directly or indirectly affected by the project. A representative can register a complaint on behalf of the affected person or group, provided that the affected person or group identifies the representative and submits evidence of the authority to act on their behalf.
- 49. What the Grievance/Complaint should contain: Any comments, complaints, queries and suggestions pertaining to safeguard compliance environment, involuntary resettlement, and indigenous people, design-related issues, compensation, service delivery or any other issues or concerns related to the project. The complaint must contain the complainant's name, date, address/contact details, location of the problem area, and the problem. A sample grievance registration form is provided in **Appendix 22**.
- 50. Where and how to file a Complaint: The complaint can be filed both online and offline. The people can submit their complaints at the contractor's site office or at PIU/PMU office. In addition, they can also have grievances/suggestions/queries submitted through phone or e-mails or the state grievance portal.
- 51. **Documentation:** PMU, with the support of PIUs, will be responsible for the timely registration of grievances, related disclosure, and communication with the aggrieved party. PMU will also ensure that all the details from submission to resolution are well recorded and documented.

- 52. **Grievance redress /Problem solving through participatory Process:** The PMU and PIUs will make efforts to resolve the problems and conflicts amicably through a participatory process with the community and the ULBs. In case of immediate and urgent grievances in the complainant's perception, the contractor and supervision personnel from the PIU will provide the most easily accessible or first level of contact to resolve grievances quickly. Contact phone numbers and names of the concerned staff and contractors will be posted and displayed at all construction sites.
- 53. **Grievance Redressal Committee:** The GoT under Tripura Urban and Tourism Development Project (TUTDP) has established the grievance redressal committees at the site, PIU and PMU levels to provide a mechanism to mediate conflict and disputes concerning compensation payments and cut down on lengthy litigation. The following will be the composition of the GRCs.
- 54. **Site-level GRC (1st level) -** The site-level GRC will comprise a Junior Engineer (site In-Charge), PIU; an Assistant Safeguard Officer, PIU; a Contractors Site Engineer; Construction Supervisor, PMSC; and a representative from the affected community (as and when required). The effort will be made to resolve issues on-site, in consultation with each other and within five days of receipt of a complaint/grievance.
- 55. **PIU level GRC (2<sup>nd</sup> level) -** All grievances that cannot be redressed within five days at the field level will be brought to the notice of the PIU-level GRC established in each PIU. The PIU-level within two days of receipt of the complaint to determine the merit of each grievance brought to the committee. GRC at the PIU level will be headed by Project Manager of PIU; Assistant/Junior Engineers of PIU; Construction Management Expert of PMSC; Assistant Safeguard Officer of PIU; Project Manager/In-charge of the concerned Contractor; Representatives from line departments and ULBs as and when required.
- 56. **PMU Level GRC (3<sup>rd</sup> level) -** In case the grievances are not addressed at the PIU level within 10 days of receipt, the same shall be brought to the notice of the PMU-level GRC. The PMU-level GRC will comprise of Project Director as chairman, a Co-Project Director as co-chairman, Additional Project Director (Urban and Tourism of PMU; Individual Safeguards Consultant (Social cum Gender) of PMU; Representatives from line departments and ULB as required and representatives of affected communities (if required)<sup>1</sup>. The committee can co-opt any other member required for the resolution of the grievances. The GRC at the PMU level will resolve the grievance within 15 days of receiving the complaint.
- 57. The complainant will be informed in writing about the resolution of their complaint or the decision of the grievance redress committees. The complainants are free to approach the court of law at any time of their own will at any stage, and accessing the country's legal system can run parallel to accessing the GRM and is not dependent on the negative outcome of the GRM.




Figure 8: Grievance Redress Mechanism

#### VIII. INFORMATION DISSEMINATION

58. The DDR will be made available for reference in the offices of the TTDCL, Office of District Administration, Project Implementation Unit, Project Management Unit and ADB website for easy access to all stakeholders including the local community of project location. Public awareness campaigns within the entire project area will ensure that awareness on grievance redress procedures is generated. The Social Safeguards and Gender Officer PMU supported by PMSC, will oversee the conduct of project coverage area-based awareness campaigns by the Safeguard Nodal Officer of concerned PIUs. The awareness campaigns will ensure that poor and vulnerable households are made aware of grievance redress procedures. Contractors will provide pamphlets to communities residing near the project location prior to start of works and information Boards during construction. The pamphlets and information boards will include relevant environmental and social safeguards, GRM information, and contact details of key personnel from PIU and contractors.

#### IX. CONCLUSION

- 59. The findings from field visit, survey, public consultation and stakeholder consultations and screening for involuntary resettlement and indigenous people impacts, suggest that the subproject is not anticipated to cause any permanent or temporary, direct or indirect, impacts. Nevertheless, the impacts of the subproject have been reassessed during finalization of detailed design (final sites and alignments and scope of work), the social safeguards document updated and ADB's clearance obtained. In case any involuntary resettlement impact is identified at any stage of the subproject implementation, this safeguard document will be revised with appropriate revision of project category in accordance with ADB's safeguard Policy Statement, 2009.
- 60. No involuntary resettlement impact is identified at the project sites for any of the subproject component as no private land acquisition, temporary or permanent will be required. There are no encroachments either and the area is not occupied by any squatters, kiosks or vendors. The proposed site is owned by the Government of Tripura. All development works will be done on Government owned land. Due to the project intervention, there will be no loss of income of any person or any assets, either privately owned or publicly owned. The proposed tourism related infrastructure improvement works will not change the present land use pattern. All facilities related civil works will be undertaken on Government land which is free of encumbrances.
- 61. The land parcels earmarked for tourism development activities are bearing multiple plot numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 580, 33 and the ownership too is lying with different departments. Out of the mentioned 9 land parcels, NOC for Plot No. 1 & 2 has been obtained from TTDCL as the said parcel of land belongs to TTDCL. On the other hand, plot no. 3 and 4 belongs to the Forest department and no project activities will be undertaken in the said plots. Location of plot no. 3 and 4 is such that it had to be taken into consideration even if no activities will be undertaken in the mentioned plot numbers. Furthermore, plot no. 5, 6, 7 and 580 is under the possession of District Magistrate & Collector, Udaipur, Gomti District and process of obtaining NOC for the same has been initiated. As per the revised design no project activities will be undertaken in plot no 580. In addition to it, plot no. 33 is under the ownership of PWD and working NOC has been provided to TTDCL.
- 62. As far as tourism related development work at Fatik Sagar and Amar Sagar is concerned, for landscaping work, NOCs have been obtained from Amarpur Nagar Panchayat and for any kind of other works related to development of front part of the lakes, NOC has been provided by the Directorate of Fisheries for both, Fatik Sagar and Amar Sagar.
- 63. Provisions have been made to ensure uninterrupted boating and fishing facilities during the construction phase. There will be no hindrances or temporary suspension of fishing, boating, or any other commercial activities in the Gomati River, located in Chabimura, to ensure the continuity of livelihood for individuals or communities (**Appendix 9**).
- 64. Compliance with applicable labour laws (listed in **Appendix-21**) including amendments issued from time to time applicable to establishments engaged in construction of civil works.
- 65. The works contractor will be required to maintain access to shops and boat riding spot located close to proposed sites, and safety through hard barricading of excavated alignments/sites. Care will be taken to avoid/mitigate economic impacts through the following measures: (i) announcement of proposed civil works in advance (to enable shop owners to stock up and remain unaffected if goods vehicles are unable to reach them during construction);(ii) provision of planks to ensure customers access to shops and boating zone; (iii) careful timing of implementation to avoid peak sale hours/days; (iv) night work, if possible; (v) minimizing construction period to the extent possible; (vi) assistance to mobile vendors if

- any, present during construction, to shift nearby; (vii) signage with project details and contact details for grievance redress. These measures will be part of the contract and will be implemented through it, with careful monitoring by the concerned PIU.
- 66. To further minimize the possibility of construction impacts, work will be executed during the early morning hours in order to avoid inconveniences to the visitors/tourists and also to related business activities. All safety norms would strictly be adhered to and the Project Implementation Unit (PIU) will also ensure that all the necessary compliances are observed by the contractor.
- 67. A budgetary provision is made for costs likely to be incurred by TTDCL for completion of all formalities related to this due diligence report. This includes provisions towards communication and grievance redress (INR 150,000), impact assessment and socio-economic survey cost including IP/schedule tribe households (INR 1,50,000), consultation and various awareness activities including IP/scheduled tribe households (INR 2,00,000), training programs through convergence with government programs for IP/scheduled tribes (INR 300,000). and 10% percent contingencies (INR 80,000), i.e., a total of INR 8,80,000.

#### X. NEXT STEPS

- 68. This Due Diligence Report has been updated based on revised design (as per approved master plan) till date. Based on the obtaining of NOCs from other related departments the DDR will again be updated as required.
- 69. Formal and informal consultations will be carried out including, but not limited to focus group discussions (FGDs), public meetings, community discussions, and key informant interviews. Intensive information dissemination campaign will be conducted. The updated DDR will include details of such consultations.
- 70. Copies of Land Records/ NOCs from the concerned departments (District Magistrate & Collector, Udaipur, Gomti District, Forest department) and Land transfer documents from other concerned departments along with self -certification from TTDCL will be appended in the updated DDR.
- 71. The Due Diligence Report to be further updated, initiation and completion of due procedures reported and ADB approval obtained after getting approval of the final design.



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#### Background:

The ADB and the Govt. of India signed a \$4.21 million project readiness financing (PRF) facility in December 2020 for the preparation of infrastructure development projects to improve urban amenities and develop tourism infrastructure in the northeastern state of Tripura.

PDMC team has identified and listed subprojects for all 5 major destinations and 2 major tourist circuits in Tripura. There is a need to discuss the selection of subprojects with the stakeholders. At same time, financial resources in the form of loan would not be enough to execute all subprojects under ADB loan. Hence, prioritization of subprojects among the list for each destination requires to be discussed in close consultation and coordination with respective stakeholders of the state.

PDMC team on getting the confirmed list for each destination would start preparing Preliminary Project Reports for subprojects under each destination. These reports will form the base for the loan application to ADB. In the context of above background, it is strongly felt and also advised by ADB that a Workshop for finalization of priority subprojects for each destination needs to be organized in consultation with all concerned stakeholders. Accordingly, one day long stakeholder's workshop was organized by TTDCL on 24<sup>th</sup> August 2021 to discuss and debate on the long list of sub-projects and prepare a list of prioritized sub-projects. Stakeholders included prominent Hoteliers of Tripura, Tour Operators and Facilitators, Travel agents, Transporters, Adventure Sports organizers, Offbeat Camping Club and Moto-Bikers association members, Tripura Restaurant Owners Association members and TTDCL Tour Guides etc.

#### Brief Minutes of the meeting are as under;

- Managing Director TTDCL at the very onset of the workshop briefly explained the background of
  the project and the agenda of this meeting and its importance to all the members. He thanked
  all the stakeholders for their presence and also assured that such group workshops shall be
  conducted often for the participations and valuable comments from various stakeholders of
  Tripura Tourism sector.
- Team Leader, PDMC started the workshop by presenting the project background and other relevant details. After that he explained the objective of this workshop. A detailed presentation was given in the meeting to explain the tourism strategy, proposed tourism products and fund availability under the ensuing loan, to all the member so that deliberations and discussions can be done on the long list sub-projects.
- Deputy Team Leader PDMC explained very lucidly the parameters considered for the assessment and prioritization of the sub-projects and informed the stakeholders, how to fill up

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- the feedback forms. PDMC shared the hardcopies of the longlist of sub-projects with all the stakeholders so that they can provide their feedbacks in prioritizing the sub-projects according to the selection criteria mentioned.
- 4. Managing Director, TTDCL suggested all the stakeholders not to give quick responses and requested them to take the feedback forms back home so that the members can give their feedbacks on the sub-projects after due pondering. All the members agreed to this suggestion and agreed to submit their feedbacks to TTDCL by 27<sup>th</sup> August 2021.
- 5. As per the schedule of the workshop, "Q&A and discussions about The Constraints Faced By The Stakeholders" session was initiated and all the stakeholders were asked to share their concerns, remarks and issues they face while handling tourists. All the members present shared their concerns, issues they are currently facing and even provided suggestions to TTDCL on how to overcome these issues. The stakeholders unanimously voiced and highlighted that basic infrastructure development works like last mile connectivity with good road, dedicated parking zones, hygienic public amenities like toilets and restrooms for tourists and other visitors, reception and waiting areas etc. are very important for each tourist destination and TTDCL should focus on these works as top priority. The stakeholders also agreed that undertaking road development works and all other tourist infrastructure development at the initial phase will definitely boost tourist footfall at all the Tripura tourist destinations undoubtedly.
- 6. The individual concerns of all the members were noted which are drafted attached herewith as
- The Joint Managing Director TTDCL communicated with each of the stakeholders and assured that all the issues raised shall be grouped and addressed accordingly.
- 8. The workshop was concluded by the Managing Director by enlightening the members about the present works that are being done by the Government of Tripura in the Tourism sector under various schemes and also highlighted about the works that are envisaged to be covered under this ADB loan-PRF scheme. He also explained the importance and role of all the Tripura Tourism stakeholders in making Tripura a safe, exciting and popular tourism destination in the country. To discuss the proposed sub project list under ADB funding program with the Hon'ble Tourism Minister and to highlight the issues such as availability and use of Khash land, forest land, permissions and clearances required from various departments for tourism development project.

#### Background:

The ADB and the Govt. of India signed a \$4.21 million project readiness financing (PRF) facility in December 2020 for the preparation of infrastructure development projects to improve urban amenities and develop tourism infrastructure in the northeastern state of Tripura under Tripura Urban and Tourism Development Project (TUTDP) - Tourism Component (ADB Loan no. 6037-IND).

#### Minutes of the meeting:

 Team Leader PDMC presented the power point presentation explaining the project background, role of the State Government and ADB in this PRF facility along with the destinations and component wise proposed block cost expenditure details (as per conceptual plans) were discussed with the Hon'ble Minister.

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PDMC explained the importance of encumbrance free land requirement criteria for the project to be executed under ADB loan and requested assistance of the Hon'ble Minister in providing TTDCI, with available Govt. Khash land (land under State Govt. ownership) near the important tourist destinations.

#### 3. Udaipur City Destination:

- i. Since Udaipur city was the previous capital of the Manikya dynasty and Udaipur is popularly known as the 'City of Lakes & Temples' which have high tourism potential, the Hon'ble Tourism Minister instructed the team to consider and develop three popular lakes of Udaipur town namely Mahadev Dighi, Amar Sagar and Dhoni Sagar under this loan along with the development of Temples Heritage Walk.
- He also suggested upgradation of the last mile connectivity and other facilities near the Old Bhubaneshwari Temple and Old Rajbari (outside ASI demarcation).
- iii. He also informed that land of approximately 25 Kani (9.9 Acres) is available at Udaipur that can be proposed for the development of a Government Luxury Tourist accommodation facility.

#### 4. Chabimura:

- The Hon'ble Tourism Minister advised the team to consider the required protection measures for the protection of the rock cut sculptures at Chabimura.
- He also suggested that the entry point by Trek route from Bagma village to Chabimura should also be developed apart from the existing Maharani Barrage and Amarpur side entry.
- He also suggested development of proper accessibility to the Chabimura waterfall site.

#### 5. Dumbur Lake:

- Alternative entry to Dumbur Lake and Jetty location should be finalized somewhere close to Mandir Ghat towards Rashyabari Road.
- Hon'ble Minsiter also suggested to upgrade all the facilities and make the abandoned cottages near Mandir Ghat re-operational.
- iii. He instructed TTDCL to assess all the Tourism Department properties and make them operational. He also instructed TTDCL to prepare and update Tourism Properties register.

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- iv. Adequate accommodation facilities is one of the prime requirement of Dumbur Lake tourism development. Existing old building of Saima Lodge can be demolished and a new 50-75 room modern accommodation facility can be constructed there.
- v. TL PDMC mentioned about the 17 Acres land available at one of the twin islands under the ownership of Dumbur Hyder Power Project, land parcel at available at Chittopara near Narikel Kunj, Amulyadhanpara which is owned by Dumbur Hydel Project and these lands can be used for Tourism Development, if the development rights can be obtained.

#### 6. Unakoti:

- Hon'ble Minister agreed for the development of tourist accommodation and other allied facilities at the Sonamukhi (12.5 Acres land allotted to TTDCL).
- PDMC mentioned about the subproject that is considered to develop public amenities and other facilities at the Tirupati Sringeri Temple.

#### 7. Neermahal:

- Hon'ble Minister suggested that the team should meet the Dy. CM for the better understanding of Tripura Heritage Tourism in relation to Manikya Dynasty monuments like Neermahal.
- He emphasized that interior planning of the Neermahal should be in accordance with its original historic setting.
- He suggested that Veeramma and Jagannath Temples should also be made as spokes of the itinerary of the Neermahal destination.

TL, PDMC requested Hon'ble Minister Tourism for some time to appraise about the ADB project progress and seek his valuable guidance to which the Minister asked MD, TTDCL to arrange a meeting at the Minister's chamber for further detail discussion. Other officers of TTDCL also mentioned about other available lands near Udaipur which can be shown to PDMC for planning any tourism related facilities.

MD TTDCL thanked the Hon'ble Minister for his time and valuable guidance. The meeting ended with a vote of thanks to the chair.

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#### Agenda:

To appraise about the potential for tourism development in Tripura and to discuss the proposed list of projects proposed under ADB funding program with various stakeholders involving various line departments. The meeting was schedule to seek observations of the stakeholders and to identify the issues related to tourism development projects across the state. Among all the stake holders, invitees included SDM's of all sub division, Public Works Department, Forest Department, Water Resource Department, ASI Circle Office. ADB's consultant team was also present during the meeting. It may be noted that prior to this workshop another stakeholder workshop was conducted in August 2021 which involved tour operators, tourist guides, hoteliers and other allied tourism service providers

#### Background:

The ADB and the Govt. of India signed a \$4.21 million project readiness financing (PRF) facility in December 2020 for the preparation of infrastructure development projects to improve urban amenities and develop tourism infrastructure in the northeastern state of Tripura under Tripura Urban and Tourism Development Project (TUTDP) - Tourism Component (ADB Loan no. 6037-IND).

#### Minutes of the meeting:

- Mr. Arghya Saha, Jt. Director TTDCL welcomed all the stakeholders present in the web
  meeting and conveyed the importance of this workshop for developing tourism in the state.
- Team Leader PDMC gave the presentation and explained the project background, role of the State Government and ADB in this PRF facility along with the Important destinations and component wise proposed block cost expenditure details (as per conceptual plans).
- Team Leader PDMC gave a brief description of subprojects identified in each destination and explained its need and development potential. Further he asked all the stakeholders to share their observations and suggestions if any.

#### For Archaeological Sites: ASI Circle Office, Aizwal

- 4. Mr.Reddy from ASI Circle office, Aizwal suggested that all the development proposals within 100-300m of ASI protected heritage areas must be routed through the Competent Authority. The competent authority for approving all development works nearby Archaeological Sites in Tripura is the Director of Higher Education and all correspondence must be routed through their office.
- ASI Circle office mentioned that creation of public amenities at protected site is permitted and competent authority has discretionary power to give such permissions after proper review of the proposals.
- ASI Circle office, Aizwal also mentioned that regarding restoration and conservation works of heritage structures and if competent authority is unable to provide permission, it can be also

- obtained from National Monument Authority, New Delhi however the proposal has to be moved through competent authority.
- 7. ADB representatives stated that funds allocated under ADB program cannot be transferred to other departments as Force Accounts for carrying out proposed works and asked PDMC team to convey this to implementing agency and all stake holders. TL, PDMC clarified that this has been previously explained and informed to Tripura Tourism Development corporation limited (TTDCL).

# Chabimura, Dumbur, Jampui and Unakoti: Forest Department

- Mr. Debnath, Conservator of forest and Nodal officer for Tourism development expressed the need for formation of field committee at zone level which can be chaired by SDM and other participants may include forest range officers and local representatives.
- 9. Mr. Debnath further iterated the need for involving local people and their capacity building. TL, PDMC informed that capacity building is already one of the top priorities of this project and it is also one of allied objective of the ADB program to boost economic development and generate employment which can be done only through involving local communities. TL, PDMC also mentioned that presently in sites such as Chabimura, Neermahal and Dumbur local community are involved for boating and other allied activities.
- ADB representatives suggested to conduct socio economic and environmental surveys at the earliest as most of the projects are near forest and tribal areas.

#### Udaipur

- 11. SDM Udaipur offered to provide all assistance with regards to revenue maps, local admisnistrative assistance in carrying out the development works around the identified unprotected heritage structures.
- 12. For the lake front development projects, SDM Udaipur mentioned that development work of Jagannath Dighi is already in progress and is being carried out by TTDCL while a proposal from TUDA has come to their office for Mahadev Dighi. Amar Sagar and Dhani Sagar lakes are not proposed to be developed under any scheme and can be taken up for development under this ADB project.
- 13. DTL PDMC expressed his concern regarding the land along the bank of Maharani Barrage and requested SDM Udaipur to intervene in this matter and facilitate the land allocation process so that river front development works can be planned near the barrage.

#### Unakoti

- 14. SDM, Kailashar mentioned that around 12 acres of land at Sonamukhi near Unakoti heritage site has been allotted to tourism department, he further informed that their office has submitted the proposal to government for Helipad establishment.
- 15. SDM, Kailashar also referred to a site of around 69 acres, a marshy land along Chinir Bagan, which could be developed for bird watching and other allied tourism activities.
- 16. SDM Kailsahar also expressed the need for a restaurant near Unakoti heritage site and mentioned that Unakoti Eco Park could be the ideal location for the same.
- 17. Mr. Debnath, Forest Nodal office mentioned that for all development woks other than forestry, proposal can be sent to DFO or through SDM to obtain permission in the forest area and Eco parks managed by forest department.

#### **Energy Conservation: TREDA**


18. Mr. Debabrata Sukla Das from Tripura Renewable Energy Development Authority suggested to incorporate the provisions for renewable energy in all the development proposals. TL, PDMC informed that all necessary provision has already been considered and a proposal has also been made to install roof top solar panels in all the tourist lodges operated by TTDCL.

#### Consultants: ADB

- 19. ADB Consultant team iterated the fact that for carrying out all development works preference must be given to government land and ensure that also environmental and social safeguard issues are being taken care of.
- 20. ADB team also mentioned that any incentive programs run by the state government must be incorporated in the proposals such as subsidy for procuring solar panels.
- ADB team highlighted to obtain all necessary NOC's and to keep it in record for this investment program.
- ADB team advised to include proposal for District Tourism Promotion Council as a part of institutional development.

MD TTDCL thanked all the participants present in the workshop and mentioned that with thisINR 550 crores of investment through ADB program, Tripura Tourism envisages to take a giant leap and this would usher growth in tourism sector which will boost economy of the state. He further highlighted the need for participation of all line departments for successfully carrying out tourism development projects and wished that these kinds of workshops may be conducted again in near future to sort out all issues and to seek guidance and observation from other departments for a holistic development.

The workshop ended with vote of thanks to the Chair and all the stakeholders.







OF THE OTHER PART

WHEREAS, the lesser created different infrastructures at Chabimura for the interest of the visiting tourists known under the project "Destination Development of Chabimura" consisting of 5 nos. Motor Boats, 3 nos. Tourist Cottage, Interpretation Centre, Toilet Block, Tourist shed, Cultural stage, Path Way, Staircase, Guide point, Picnic spot, Ticket Counter, Parking area, Water facilities etc within the compound of the said premises as described in the schedule attached herewith and also decided to introduce of running of motor boats in the river for visiting tourists, rent for cottages, entry fee for and heavy vehicles, rent for picnic spot, entry fee for interpretation centres, running of toilet block of pay & use system and is furnished with fixtures and fittings etc. particularly described in the said schedule to be used for the benefit of the visiting tourists.

AND WHEREAS, the said lessor expressed his intention to let out of the infrastructures created at Chabimura for the interest of the visiting tourists (including operation of motor boats, Cottages, Interpretation centers, Cafeteria, Toilet Block, Tourist shed, Path Way, Staircase, Ticket Counter etc) to a private entrepreneur for the purpose of running and management of the assets on the terms and conditions hereinafter mentioned.

AND WHEREAS, the said Lessee has agreed to the said proposal subject to the terms and conditions mentioned below:

### NOW this DEED witnessed as follows:-

#### 1. Commercial Term

- 1.1 Security Deposit
- i) The Chabimura tourist spot, belonging to the lesser is let out to the Lessee on i) the lessee shall furnish security money of Rs.90,000/- (Rupees ninety thousand) only to the Managing Director, TTDC Ltd in the form of demand draft of any Nationalized Bank before execution of this deed.
- ii) The security money is a guarantee for the fulfilment and performance of the terms and conditions herein after contained by the lessee. In the event of the lessee committing and breach of any of the terms and conditions herein contained and on his part to be observed and performed, the lesser shall without prejudice to his right and remedies are entitled to forfeit the security deposit or any part thereof made in the terms of these presents from the said Cont......P/3

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security deposit, the lessee shall pay such additional sum immediately as will be called upon by the licensor to make up such difference so that security deposit shall at all times during the continuance of the lease be the said sum of Rs. 90,000/-(Rupees thirty thousand) only. On the expiration on earlier determination of the terms of the lease the licensor shall return the security deposit or part thereof which has not been forfeited as aforesaid to the lessee without interest.

#### Monthly Lease Rent

F R P speed Boats having the persons bearing engine & 22 12 of 7001040(F40FELT),7001041(F40FELT),7001119(F50FELT),7001117(F50FELT) and 7001039(F40FELT) 3 nos. twine Tourist Cottage, Interpretation Centre, Toilet Block, Tourist shed, Cultural stage, Path Way, Staircase, Guide point, Picnic spot, Ticket Counter, Parking area, Drinking water facilities, Cafeteria etc which are let out to the Lessee on a monthly license fee of Rs. 45,000/-(Rupees forty five thousand) only per month plus service tax as applicable during the period from September to February of each year and Rs.29,000/- in rest of the year (March to August) from the date entering into the agreement in the form of Demand Draft in favour of the Managing Director, TTDC Ltd through any Nationalized Bank for operation, maintenance and management of the infrastructure created at Chabimura Tourist destination for a period of 1(one) year w. e. f. 1st February-2021.

If the lessee fails to pay the monthly rent in time, interest has to be paid at the rate of 10% per annum by the lessee. The licensor shall have the right to collect the defaulted amount together with interest from the security money and the lessee shall recoup the security money immediately.

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#### 2. Lease Period

The lessee shall enjoy the right of uses of the assets such as Motor Boats, Tourist shed, Cultural stage, Path Way, Staircase, Guide point, Cafeteria, Ticket Counter, Parking area, Drinking water facilities etc for a period of 1 (one) year from the date of signing of Deed of Agreement w. e. f. 1st February 2021 to. 31st January-2022.

2.1 Based on the satisfactory performance during the previous terms of contract, the lease period may be extended for next term as per the Mutually accepted terms of contracts.

3. Right of the Lessee

3.1 All assets including accessories etc shall continue to remain the assets of the TTDC Ltd during and after the lease period. The lessee shall enjoy the right of the hiring charges of Motor and country boats, use of Toilet Blocks, rent of cottages, charges of parking of vehicles, entry fee of Interpretation Centre, rate of eatable goods in the Cafeteria etc from the visitors as per notification issued by the TTDC Ltd time to time. All kind of entry fees / rent shall also imply to those visitors who shall come to Chabimura from Maharani side and other side to Chabimura. The lessee could use all accessories for 1(One) year from the date of entering into the agreement, subject to fulfilment of commercial terms along with the other responsibilities.

4. Responsibility of the Lessee

- 4.1 Expenditure for petty repair and maintenance work including regular clearing of Chabimura area and the infrastructures and any expenditure incurred for alternation or replacement or repair whatsoever required of any of the fixtures, fittings etc. as described in the schedule attached herewith should be borne by the lessee without causing the inconvenience of Chabimura.
- 4.2 The lessee shall be responsible for maintenance of F.R.P. of Speed Boats and minor repairing of cottage, Interpretation centre, Toilet Block etc. The lessee shall bear the cost of all consumables for daily operational management including periodical servicing of boats to be carried out by the designated AMC holder in presence of the authorised officials of TTDCL

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- 4.3 The Lessee shall make all necessary arrangements in the cottages so that the visitors/tourist may avail the cottages comfortably.
- 4.4 Monthly electric consumption bill shall be borne by the lessee.
- The lessee shall ensure the requisite protection of each property of the TTDC Ltd. (ii) any damage of the property of the TTDC Ltd if caused on account of negligence from the part of lessee, the lessee will be charged for remitting the losses occurred due to its negligence.
- 4.6 The lessee shall ensure regarding wearing of life- Jacket for each tourist availing river safari.
- 4.7 The lessee shall ensure operation of boat service through the trained driver /helper only.
- The lessee shall not utilize the boat for the purpose other than tourism.
- The lessee shall not run the boat beyond the loading capacity. 4.9
- 4.10 No illegal activities/anti-social activities to be allowed in the premises of Chabimura.
- 4.11 The lessee will collect revenue from the visitors as per notification issued by the TTDCL after issue payment receipt.
- 4.12 The lessee shall not erect or display any kind of advertisement inside or outside the premises without approval of TTDCL in writing.
- 4.13 No Structure, temporary or permanent, shall be erected, fixed or alternation carried out by the lessee in the said premises or garden thereto or in the vacant place within the Chabimura complex without prior written permission from the lesser.
- 4.14 The lessee shall not do or permit to be done any act or thing which causes damage or likely to cause damage to the said premises. The cost of rectification of such damage will be recovered from the lessee.

#### General Instruction

The lessee should display a rate chart approved by TTDCL of every item like entry fee of visitors, entry fee of vehicles, rent of cottages, rent of motor boat, rowing boat, picnic spot, use of toilets, guide fee etc. for public awareness.

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- 5.2 The operational staffs of the Motor boat and cottages including other activities deployed by the lessee shall wear the uniform (T-shirt) to be selected by TTDCL during the operation time. The uniform shall be provided by the lessee without fail.
- 5.3 The Lessee shall keep and maintain a Complaint Book in their office at Chabimura and make it available for the visitors/tourists. The contact /Whatsapp number of the TTDCL officials shall also be displayed in the conspicuous area of the Chabimura for lodging any complaint/queries.
- 5.4 The entry gate/ticket counter of Chabimura should remain open for the visitors every day and the permission for boating restrict to sunset.
- 5.5 The TTDCL shall be responsible for declaration of prohibited zone on the way to cave & sculpture as well as bank of the river water for providing environment pollution free area. According to that, some signage shall be erected by the TTDCL in front of sculpture, cave and places on the bank of river path depicting the penalty provision, wherein lessee shall liable to collect the penalty from the visitors.
- 5.6 The lessee shall provide all facilities free of cost of TTDCL personnals.

6. Penalty Clause:-

The lessee shall have to deposit monthly lease rent within 10th of the next month. If the lessee fails to pay the monthly lease rent (after 11th of the next month) in time, interest has to be paid at the rate of 10% per annum by the lessee. If monthly rent is due consecutively for 3 months in that event the lesser shall have right to terminate the allotment and rescind the agreement. The lesser shall have the right to collect the defaulted amount together with interest from the next month.

7. Termination of Agreement

The lesser reserves the right to terminate the period of lease by giving 1(one) month notice to lessee in case of even within the period of lease, for violation of above mentioned terms & conditions.

#### 8. Arbitration

### Appendix 23: Compliance to Applicable Labour Laws

- (i) Including Amendments Issued from Time to Time Applicable to Establishments Engaged in Construction of Civil Works
- (ii) Workmen Compensation Act, 1923 The Act provides for compensation in case of injury by accident arising out of and during the course of employment.
- (iii) Payment of Gratuity Act, 1972 Gratuity is payable to an employee under the Act on satisfaction of certain conditions on separation if an employee has completed 5 years' service or more or on death at the rate of 15 days wages for every completed year of service. The Act is applicable to all establishments employing 10 or more employees.
- (iv) Employees' PF and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952 The Act provides for monthly contributions by the employer plus workers @10 % or 8.33 %. The benefits payable under the Act are: (a) Pension or family pension on retirement or death as the case may be; (b) deposit linked insurance on the death in harness of the worker; (c) payment of PF accumulation on retirement/death etc.
- (v) Maternity Benefit Act, 1951 The Act provides for leave and some other benefits to women employees in case of confinement or miscarriage etc.
- (vi) Contract Labour (Regulation and Abolition) Act, 1970 The Act provides for certain welfare measures to be provided by the Contractor to contract labor and in case the Contractor fails to provide, the same are required to be provided by the Principal Employer by Law. The principal employer is required to take Certificate of Registration and the Contractor is required to take a License from the designated Officer. The Act is applicable to the establishments or Contractor of principal employer if they employ 20 or more contract labor.
- (vii) Minimum Wages Act, 1948 The employer is supposed to pay not less than the Minimum Wages fixed by appropriate Government as per provisions of the Act if the employment is a scheduled employment. Construction of Buildings, Roads and Runways are scheduled employment.
- (viii) Payment of Wages Act, 1936 It lays down as to by what date the wages are to be paid, when it will be paid and what deductions can be made from the wages of the workers.
- (ix) Equal Remuneration Act, 1979 The Act provides for payment of equal wages for work of equal nature to Male and Female workers and not for making discrimination against Female employees in the matters of transfers, training and promotions etc.
- (x) Payment of Bonus Act, 1965 The Act is applicable to all establishments employing 20 or more workmen. The Act provides for payments of annual bonus subject to a minimum of 8.33 % of wages and maximum of 20 % of wages to employees drawing `3,500/- per month or less. The bonus to be paid to employees getting `2,500/- per month or above up to `.3, 500/- per month shall be worked out by taking wages as `.2, 500/- per month only. The Act does not apply to certain establishments. The newly set up establishments are exempted for five years in certain circumstances. Some of the State Governments have reduced the employment size from 20 to 10 for the purpose of applicability of

the Act.

- (xi) Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 The Act lays down the machinery and procedure for resolution of industrial disputes, in what situations a strike or lock-out becomes illegal and what are the requirements for laying off or retrenching the employees or closing down the establishment.
- (xii) Industrial Employment (Standing Orders) Act, 1946 It is applicable to all establishments employing 100 or more workmen (employment size reduced by some of the States and Central Government to 50). The Act provides for laying down rules governing the conditions of employment by the employer on matters provided in the Act and get the same certified by the designated Authority.
- (xiii) Trade Unions Act, 1926 The Act lays down the procedure for registration of trade unions of workmen and employees. The trade unions registered under the Act have been given certain immunities from civil and criminal liabilities.
- (xiv) Child Labor (Prohibition and Regulation) Act, 1986 The Act prohibits employment of children below 14 years of age in certain occupations and processes and provides for regulation of employment of children in all other occupations and processes. Employment of child labor is prohibited in Building and Construction Industry.
- (xv) Inter-State Migrant Workmen's (Regulation of Employment and Conditions of Service) Act,
- (xvi) 1979- The Act is applicable to an establishment which employs 5 or more inter-state migrant workmen through an intermediary (who has recruited workmen in one state for employment in the establishment situated in another state). The inter-state migrant workmen, in an establishment to which this Act becomes applicable, are required to be provided certain facilities such as housing, medical aid, traveling expenses from home up to the establishment and back, etc.
- (xvii) The Building and Other Construction Workers (Regulation of Employment and Conditions of Service) Act, 1996 and the Cess Act of 1996 All the establishments who carry on any building or other construction work and employ 10 or more workers are covered under this Act. All such establishments are required to pay Cess at rate not exceeding 2% of the cost of construction as may be notified by the Government. The employer of the establishment is required to provide safety measures at the building or construction work and other welfare measures, such as canteens, first-aid facilities, ambulance, housing accommodation for workers near the workplace etc. The employer to whom the Act applies has to obtain a registration certificate from the Registering Officer appointed by the Government.

- 1.2. The Committee will be notified by the Project Manager (PIU).
- 1.3. Prior to registering the complaint/query, a procedural step will be in place to assess and check that issues raised in the complaint fall within the scope that the GRM is mandated to address.
- 1.4. Grievances thus accepted, acknowledged, and registered will be responded to the complainant in writing within 5 days' time and in the prescribed manner.
- 1.5. A Grievance Register will be maintained at the site level by this designated official to register the grievance as per the prescribed format attached in Annexure-I, including details of the date and type of grievance received the date of personal hearing provided to the complainant, the date when the grievance was redressed or if not redressed date of forwarding the grievance to the next level GRC.
- 1.6. Provision will be made to record and maintain grievances received directly on-site and incorporated in the Grievance Register. This will serve as the First Level of Grievance resolution.
- 1.7. Grievances that cannot be resolved at the site level within 5 days or in cases where the complainant is not satisfied with the decision, will be referred to the PIU-level (2<sup>nd</sup> level) GRC.
- 1.8. Grievances that do not reach a resolution at the PIU-level GRC (2<sup>nd</sup> level) within 10 days or in case where the complainant is not satisfied with the decision, will be further escalated to PMU level (3<sup>rd</sup> level) GRC.

With reference to complaints related to Gender Based Violence (GBV) / Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (SEA), the PIU will refer the case to the concerned Service Provider with an intimation to the Internal Committee (IC) under PMU and PIU and adhere to the principle of confidentiality while informing the same to the site level GRC (if required) as the case may be.

### Notification

Department of Economic Affairs (DEA), Ministry of Finance, Gol considered a proposal from Government of Tripura regarding Externally Aided Projects (EAPs) and accordingly, a PRF (Project Readiness Fund) of ADB loan \$4.21m (approx.34.52Cr.) was approved by ADB and the main project loan is of amount of \$100.00 million which is ensuing. As part of sanctioning process of ensuing loan, ADB Fact Finding Mission (FFM) team visited to the state which was held during 18th -25th May, 2023 and the FFM team presented a report to the Chief secretary on 25-05-2023 in a wrap up meeting and ADB has summarily presented the 1st phase approved components for the state in Urban component for 12 towns and 6 nos. of tourism destinations. They have communicated Aide-memoire to the state where total cost estimates for Urban and Tourism projects together is \$ 125.00 million (Rs. 1025.00 Cr. approx.), out of which the cost of civil works is Rs. 699.45 Cr., out of that the cost of Urban Infrastructure is Rs. 530.54 Cr. and Tourism Infrastructure is Rs. 168.91 Cr.

An Implementation arrangement in the form of PMU (Project Management Unit) and PIU (Project Implementation Unit) is required to be set up to execute the project.

Following the above and agreeing with the proposal of ADB for financing 12 towns' project and commitment for releasing the matching state share time to time as and when required along with the proposal for setting up of PMU & PIU in Urban and Tourism department, a proposal was prepared and placed before the Council of Ministers for approval on 27.09.2023. Accordingly, the Council of Ministers approved the proposal vide letter No.F.8(19)-GA (CAB)/2023, dated-06.10.2023, GA (Confidential & Cabinet) Department, Govt. of Tripura.

Consequent upon the above, as advised from ADB during their Fact-Finding Mission team visit to Tripura during 18th - 25th May, 2023 and as decided by the State Government the following PMU and PIU set up is hereby notified:

### Appendix 30: A Glimpse of Different Government Schemes for Betterment of Indigenous Peoples

### A. Tripura Tribal Welfare Residential Educational Institutions Society (TTWREIS)

- (i) With a view to impart quality education to ST boys and girls of the interior tribal villages of Tripura a society called "Tripura Tribal Welfare Residential Educational Institutions Society (TTWREIS)" was established on 2nd May 1997 under the administrative control of Tribal Welfare Department, Government of Tripura.
- (ii) The prime object of the society is to establish, maintain, control and running Eklavya Model Residential School (EMR), Residential School and Ashram School in the Tribal Sub-Plan (TSP) area of the state where the students of interior tribal villages may get quality education in English medium to prepare them in various entrance / competitive examination staying in the hostels of the schools with free of cost of education and lodging.
- (iii) At present, 4 (four) EMR, 1(one) EMDBS, 1(one) Residential and 3 (three) Ashram Schools are running under the TTWREIS. The sources of funding of the EMR School are Government of India, Ministry of Tribal Affairs and for Residential School and for Ashram School are Government of Tripura.

### B. <u>Tripura Scheduled Tribes Cooperative Development Corporation</u>

In order to take up beneficiary oriented economic programmes suitable to the Tribal families, the Scheduled Tribes Cooperative Development Corporation was set up in the State in 1979. Tripura Scheduled Tribes Co-operative Development Corporation Ltd. is providing various types of Term loans to tribal youths in various sectors i.e. Transport Sector, Agri and Allied Sector, Business sector to make them financially self dependent. The Corporation is also providing education loans to tribal students for pursuing higher studies.

### C. Pradhan Mantri Van Dhan Yojana

- (i) Pradhan Mantri Van Dhan Yojna is an initiative targeting livelihood generation for tribals by harnessing the wealth of forest i.e. Van Dhan. The programme aims to tap into traditional knowledge and skill sets of tribals by adding technology and IT to upgrade it at each stage and to convert the tribal wisdom into a viable economic activity.
- (ii) It is a Mechanism for Marketing of Minor Forest Produce (MFP) through Minimum Support Price (MSP) and Development of Value Chain. Van Dhan Vikas Kendra shall be constituted with 10 tribal Van DhanVikas Self Help Group (SHG). Each SHG will comprise of up to 30 MFP gatherers i.e. about 300 beneficiaries per Kendra (subject to variability as per local conditions.
- (iii) Hon'ble Chief Minister, launched the Pradhan Mantri Van Dhan Yojana in Tripura on 11th January, 2020 with the aim of promoting entrepreneurship among Minor Forest Produce (MFP) gatherers and artisans.
- (iv) During the year 2019-20, for an amount of Rs. 2.26 core has been sanctioned by the Government of India for setting up of 17 Van Dhan Vikas Kendra involving 4256 beneficiaries of 249 SHGs for procurement and value addition of Minor forest Produces like Broom Grass, Amla tamarind, Gandhaki etc. In the 1st Phase VDVKs will be provided support for tool kits, training and raw materials etc. In the 2nd phase fund will be provided to each VDVKs for up gradation of Pucca House, warehouse, storage, add-on equipment etc.

(v) During the year 2020-21, Ministry of Tribal Affairs, Govt. of India has sanction for an amount of Rs. 144.60 lakh for 10 nos. VDVKs.

### D. Sustainable Catchment Forest Management in Tripura(SCATFORM)

It is a new Project funded under Japanese ODA Loan to implemented over a period of 10 years beginning from 2018-19 by Tripura Forest Department with a total outlay of about Rs 1000 Crore. This is one of the largest Project in the natural resource sector in the country.

### (i) Mission

"To reduce poverty by enabling the poor households to access gainful self-employment and skilled wage employment opportunities, resulting in appreciable improvement in their livelihoods on a sustainable basis, through building strong grassroots institutions of the poor."

### (ii) Objective of the Mission

- Create sustainable community institution of women i.e. Self Help Group (SHG) and their Village and Cluster/ Block level federations.
- Provide trainings to community Institutions for democratic functioning and participatory bottom-up planning.
- Ensuring savings, credit and insurance services for poor and women.
- Increase livelihood opportunities by enhancing existing livelihoods in farm and nonfarm sectors.
- Establishing market linkage.
- Skill development and placement for unemployed youths.

### (iii) AREA OF IMPLEMENTATION

Project will be implemented in 7 districts (North Tripura, Unakoti, Khowai, West Tripura, Sepahijala, Gomati and South Tripura) under 16 Forest Sub-divisions, 36 Forest Ranges and 148 Forest Beat areas including 3 Ranges and 13 Forest Beats of Gumti Wildlife Sanctuary. There will be 450 new Joint Forest Management Committee and 1350 SHGs ( 3 SHG in each JFMC, on an average ).

### (iv) PROJECT OBJECTIVE

To improve quality of forest in the targeted catchment by sustainable forest management, soil and moisture conservation and livelihood development, thereby contributing to development of forest ecosystem services and livelihood improvement of forest dependent communities.

### E. Post Matric Scholarship (Central Sponsored Scheme)

The objective of the scheme is to provide financial assistance to the ST students studying as post matriculation or post-secondary stage to enable them to complete their education. Post Matric Scholarship is being implemented through NSP Portal.

### (i) Scheme Synopsis:

The scholarship includes maintenance allowance, provision for students with disabilities, reimbursement of compulsory. Non-refundable fees, study tour charges, thesis typing/printing charges and book allowance for students perusing correspondence courses, for complete duration of the course.


### (ii) Sponsoring Students for Job Oriented courses
